Origins of the Civil Rights Movement

World War II

- Rise of Black Urban Middle Class
- Role of Education
- End to Southern Economic Isolation
- Growing receptiveness of Courts to Civil Rights case

Important court cases prebrown

Politics

Smith vs. Allwright 1944

Outlawed white primaries

Transportation

- Morgan vs. Virginia 1946
 - Ruled Virginia could not segregate interstate bus passengers

<u>Residential</u>

- Shelley vs. Kraemer 1948
 - Racially restrictive housing covenants unenforceable






Map 27.4 Black Voter Registration in the South, 1964 and 1975




