The Gilded Age Video



The age we refer to as the Gilded Age began in the early 1870s as the country was still recovering from the bloody horrors of the Civil War. It lasted until the end of the century when the reform movements we know as the Progressive Era took hold. The impact of the Gilded Age on American society, culture, and industry should not be underestimated. It was during the last three decades of the nineteenth century that modern America was born. The growth of American industry, the development of a national economy, the conquest of the last remaining Native-American territory, and the rise of large corporations all occurred during this time. By the end of the Gilded Age the United States

had become an industrial behemoth, though not everyone benefitted equally from these developments. To understand the twentieth century, we must begin by looking at the Gilded Age.

Before you watch the video consider the following questions and use them to guide you as you watch.

- 2. Make note of the major changes that occurred during the era
- 3. What was the primary use of oil before the appearance of motor cars?
- 4. Why was steel such an important commodity?

- 6. How did railroads impact the farming sector? Consider specialization and the high cost of shipping.

- 9. Note population changes in major cities what was the trend?
- 10. What changes could be observed in the kinds of buildings being built in urban areas?
- 11. Why were immigrants courted by politicians?

- 13. How did white political leaders disenfranchise African Americans in the South?
- 14. What impact did Jim Crow laws have on African Americans?
- 15. Note the importance of the Supreme Court decision in *Plessy v. Ferguson* in 1896.

- 17. What role did the slaughter of the Buffalo herds have on the Native-American population?
- 18. What was the result of Native-American armed insurrections? Why do you think these failed?
- 19. Make note of the events at Wounded Knee. What turning point did the massacre symbolize for the Native-American population?

The Victorians

- 20. Make note of the cultural hallmarks of the "Victorian Age."
- 21. What do these tell us about the culture and outlook of Americans of the time?
- 22. Note the rise of organized, professional sports, and other forms of entertainment. What aspects of the Gilded Age made this development possible? (Hint: consider urbanization)
- 23. Why do you think the "rags to riches" stories of Horatio Alger appealed to Americans of this age?

- 26. What was the basis for the opposition many Americans had to immigration at this time?
- 27. What were some of the concerns of labor during this time? How did employers respond?

- 29. How did the Homestead and the Pullman strikes (1892 and 1894) demonstrate the weaknesses of the labor movement in the Gilded Age?
- 30. How do you explain the typical government sympathy for management in labor disputes?
- 31. Why were business leaders viewed as Robber Barons?
- 32. What was the significance of the Interstate Commerce Act 1887 and the Sherman Anti-Trust Act 1890?
